Understand Pythagoras' theorem about the lengths of sides in a right-angled triangle and test the rule.

Example:

Pythagoras' theorem states that for any right-angled triangle, the square of the length of the longest side, c , is equal to the sum of the squares of the two shorter sides, a and b . ($a^2 + b^2 = c^2$).

Draw a right-angled triangle and measure the lengths of the three sides. Then draw and cut out three squares, one of each length, to show that the area of the largest square equals the total area of the smaller two squares.
